The Vicar's Letter



Dear Brothers and Sisters,

I write this in the middle of my second week in the job. And whilst I have enjoyed myself thoroughly thus far, I have also been reminded just what complex and rich ecosystems parishes are. A parish is a web of relationships which interweave and stretch out in all directions. Some strands are new, some have been in place for decades or even centuries. All form part of the whole, and depend on one another in a variety of ways. As a newcomer, tasked with getting to grips with the physical and spiritual landscape here, I feel like an explorer, stumbling through uncharted terrain, trying to work out the connections and rhythms which are in play, following the different trails to see where they lead, digging below the surface to see where the roots lie.

This is not a complaint! Whilst I must admit that by the end of some days my head has been spinning somewhat, it is an enormous privilege to become part of our parishes' stories, and to have the opportunity to learn about them. That is my primary purpose at the moment. To shift the metaphor slightly, from exploring to gardening, I was always told that a good gardener, before pruning or planting, will first watch and wait and see what emerges in a patch of land over the cycle of seasons. I am in that stage, and even in these early days it has filled my heart with joy to see what life and love there is on display. I think of the warmth with which my family and I have been made welcome, across both parishes. My induction service at St Mark's, and the 'First Sunday' joint service at Grantchester, were tremendously happy occasions, full of the best of Christian community: joy, hope, and hospitality. And these were equally on display throughout our wonderful Autumn Fair. Thank you to everybody who played their part, and for the warmth of the welcome which you have extended to my family and me.

All this talk of ecosystems and gardens is quite fitting given that we are entering the season of harvest thanksgiving. Please do come along and take part in our Harvest Festival and lunch. The Christian faith is grounded in thanksgiving; on our acknowledgement of the fact that we are dependent on others and ultimately on God for all that sustains life. The Church encourages us to use this time to also consider wider climate issues, as part of our duty of care for the gift of creation.

My own reflections, however, keep leading me back to this notion of the parish as an ecosystem; as precious and life-giving. A parish is an enmeshment of souls, every one unique, but all, by God's Grace, trying, striving to live in the light of Christ and grow in his likeness. And we do that by nurturing relationships with one another, and with those friends, neighbours and strangers amongst whom God has planted us. This is because God is Trinity. The Scriptures reveal that there is one God, but that there is plurality within God. God is Father, Son and Holy Spirit - what classical Christian Doctrine calls the three 'persons'. The difference between a thing and a person is that a person can enter into a relationship with another. This capacity and desire for relationship and fellowship is what defines God. Human beings, we believe, are made in the image of God. We are made to be in relationship with one another. Indeed, it is only by our relationships that we are drawn out of ourselves and enabled to become more fully and authentically human.

This is in contrast to a great deal of western philosophy, which focuses the spotlight on the individual: think of Descartes' famous dictum. 'I think therefore I am'. The older. Christian alternative to this is 'I love therefore I am'. In other words, our identity and our flourishing is not something we can attain on our own, but only though a shared life within a community. Our mutual interdependence with one another and with the whole fabric of creation - something have already said, harvest which, as I thanksgiving encourages us to reflect on - is therefore not something to bemoan or even try to free ourselves from. It is something to celebrate, and give thanks for. I, for one, already feel incredibly dependent on so many of you, who have helped welcome me into this community, and I am eternally grateful.

The Installation of the Revd Jim Robinson

"This Thursday we shall be installing our new vicar. It sounds like fitting a new boiler". So remarked Andrew Hurst in his sermon on the first Sunday in September.

Four days later on the 5th September it was a great pleasure to attend the installation of Jim Robinson as Vicar of St Andrew and St Mary, Grantchester and St Mark's, Newnham. And with a full church in good voice it was a far more joyful occasion than commissioning a boiler.

It is worth quoting from the introduction to the order of service. "This service marks the beginning of a new phase of ministry for priests and people. It is one to which all come with a high sense of anticipation of God's blessing on the years ahead, and it is right that this beginning is marked by a special service both of celebration and dignity. Some features of this service have their origins in the Middle Ages; others are comparatively new".

The service was led by Alex Hughes, Archdeacon of Cambridge, and James Shakespeare, Rural Dean, who is well known to many as a former ordinand attached to St Mark's, with local clergy present. It was divided into sections starting with the Presentation of Jim to the parishes, led by Professor Godsill of Corpus Christi College as patron of Grantchester supported by representatives of the parishes. Following Bible readings and a sermon by the Archdeacon there was the Institution when members of the local ministry team came forward to join and welcome Jim. Then came the Induction during which Jim tolled the bell to signify taking

possession and was escorted to his customary stall in the chancel. In turn the Installation allowed members of both churches to deepen our commitment to God after which local community representatives and ecumenical partners came forward to welcome Jim with handshakes followed by an enthusiastic round of applause. The service concluded with Jim giving out his first notices as vicar and the great hymn "How shall I sing that majesty which angels do admire?".

The service was a happy combination of friendliness and formality. The necessary legal elements were in no way onerous or overbearing. Because installations are fortunately not frequent events the service is not perhaps well known and it provided an opportunity for reflection and prayer as Jim, together with his family, starts his new ministry with us.

A large number of people had worked hard to make the installation the undoubted success it was. The church grounds had been copiously tidied up, beautiful flowers arranged in church and delicious refreshments served at the well attended reception in the Community Centre afterwards. A combined choir under the direction of Marcus Cox led the singing of four hymns and two anthems. The churchwardens of both churches had organised the service with great care and thought. Thanks are due to all those involved. And the new church lighting proved superb on the first occasion it was used for a service after dark.

Gombe Diocese: Charity of the Month

Ten reasons for continuing our support of Gombe Diocese in Nigeria

At a time of significant change in our own community, it is inevitable that we ask ourselves where we might be going next. Underlying this article are, I think, broader questions: Should we as a church in England support the ministries of churches in other parts of the world? Isn't the church in England itself in need of money?

Over the past fifteen and more years, the St Mark's congregation has faithfully given half-yearly donations to the people of Gombe in Northern Nigeria. Is this an arrangement that we would want to see continuing? Here are my arguments for saying that as a congregation we should continue to have an international vision of the church, and thus continue to support the people of Gombe.

- 1. There is no doubt that ordinary people in the congregations of Gombe are in need of financial help. The economy of Gombe makes it difficult for them to earn a living. In one way or another they are dependent on farming. And this is an area south of the Sahara which does not support year-round natural growth.
- 2. The people in Gombe generally face multiple problems. They are not members of an important state and do not have access to the kind of funds available to other areas of Nigeria. Their problems are not just of personal poverty, but of the failure of governments to support even basic facilities needed for education and health.
- 3. Generally St Mark's congregations are concerned about the inequalities in the world. We want to do whatever we can to support those of our fellow human beings who struggle to survive against the odds which the modern world throws at them.
- 4. Jesus gave the church an international ministry. His instruction to the earliest disciples was that they should see their ministry as reaching "to the end of the earth". (Acts 1 v.9)

- 5. We cannot give to all cases of need, but because of an original contact with Gombe, we can feel that we are giving as directly as possible, through their diocese, to people who struggle through hard times.
- 6. Our link with Gombe came to us as an individual link with a student of Dan Hardy's (Perrin's husband). Dan tutored Henry Ndukubah in Durham before Henry returned to Gombe as its first bishop. Having met Henry and having received frequent communications and photos from the diocese we can see this as people from Newnham giving to people in Gombe.
- 7. We know that in their congregations the people of Gombe combine together to respond to the challenges which their communities face. It has been a privilege for our congregation to see how their efforts to build schools and health facilities are supported by local enthusiasm, for minimal cost.
- 8. We know from their frequent letters of thanks that our financial support is greatly appreciated.
- 9. They also appreciate our general concern and prayerful support. It is important that they do not feel alone in their struggles. A recent message from the diocese, which tells us how our money is being used, also asks: "Please keep us in your prayers as a Church and Nation. Things have taken a turn for Nigeria The killings, poverty, inflation, corruption and Religious fanaticism. We are struggling to survive at this point."
- 10. The fact that we would be in this for the long term is a positive witness to the identity of our congregation. Children of our local school who come to visit our church building see the gifts we have been given by Gombe and they speak of the kind of community we are.

With the death of Stuart from cancer St Mark's has lost a cornerstone. When I saw him at the hospice a week before he died he said, "no eulogies" but surely we cannot let his life and work for us and Cambridge go unrecorded.

Stuart loved the natural world, particularly its birds. With Rita he travelled far to see them always returning happily to watch the Rugby at Grange Road. He was a staunch conservationist.

But it is for his work that he will be remembered. Almost 20 years ago he quietly offered to succeed Tony Dathan, another hero of St Mark's, as Church Treasurer when he saw Tony fading. He brought to us the experience of running his own accountancy practice and within a few years had quadrupled our reserves, securing our future. He was modest, summing up a year's work in one or two sentences. His advice was always sought and followed. Once

convinced, he supported all our projects with great enthusiasm and imagination. He was trusted with generous gifts! In all this Rita was an able partner.

His name was a byword for Charity. For us he created The Charity of the Month. He did the same as a Freemason. His kindness to individuals was little known but sometimes life changing.

When his luck ran out he faced Rita's ill health and then his own unflinchingly.

He was a man of few words and quiet faith. He wouldn't have wanted this to be any longer.

There is a children's corner in church which houses toys and books which you can use when visiting the church, whether during a service or not. There are also books in the entrance to the Community Centre which is where you will find our toilets and changing facilities too. We do not mind if children make a noise during services (in fact, we are glad to hear young people joining in!) and if there is any way in which we can make you more comfortable while you visit or worship with us, please get in touch.

Toddles



Toddles is our stay-and-play group for babies and toddlers and their parents and carers. We run from 9.30 am - 11.00 am on Thursday mornings during school term-time in the Large Hall of our Community Centre (behind the

church). We have a good range of high-quality toys for a variety of ages, from a baby mat where babies can play safely, to wooden vehicles, several scuttlebugs (tricycles), a trampoline, and Mega Blocks. There is lots of space in the hall for children to ride and play, and we can use the small yard outside in good weather. When it is cold outside the hall is well heated, and when it is warm outside we offer some shelter from the sun.

Toddles is free to attend, although donations are welcome. Warm drinks are provided for adults, and baby/toddler snacks are available for the little ones. No need to book, just turn up when you can make it and we will be happy to see you!

Messy Church



Messy Church takes place in the main church building on the first Tuesday of each month during school term-time, from 3.30 pm until 5.30 pm. Each session offers a

variety of crafts and activities for children to take part in, as well as a good selection of toys for younger children to play with. Before we share a meal or go home, there is a story and a song.

All children must be accompanied by at least one adult. Free to attend, with drinks and biscuits provided as you arrive. There is a warm meal at 5.00 pm for anyone who wishes to stay and eat together. Our next session is on the 1st October.

Junior Church



Junior Church takes place on the second, third and fourth Sunday of each month during school term-time. We all begin in the main church service at 9.30 am, before

leaving to take part in our own worship using a method called 'Godly Play'. This method is accessible for all, as it involves listening to a story which is told with props, and then responding in whichever way we feel moved to respond. There is a variety of materials and books, which children can use and play with once the story has been told.

All children are welcome, and their adult(s) can join them if they would like to or can remain in the main church service.

Youth

We are currently looking at what might be a good successor to our M&Ms youth group which lost momentum. We have several secondary-schoolaged young people involved in our congregation and Junior Church and we might make a group together soon. 
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


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On the buses
