A Letter from Bethan, our Curate



Dear Friends

It doesn't seem very long ago that James and I came to meet Rachel, in December 2021, to look round these two parishes and see whether they might be the place God was calling us for my curacy training. Somehow, here we are just over three years later as my role as curate here comes to an end! Time flies!

My last Sunday ministering in these two wonderful parishes, Grantchester and Newnham, will be the 2nd March, which may well have passed by the time you read this. If it hasn't, please do join me at St Mark's at 9:30am for my final service and a bit of a celebration of the last three years. We won't be moving immediately from the area as we will be welcoming our first child in April and continuing to live here through my period of maternity leave. I'm sure we'll see many of you around during that time.

I want to take this opportunity to thank each of you who has welcomed us here and been part of my curacy. I have learnt so, so much from each of you. My expectations, from when we first arrived, of journeying alongside you, gradually dipping my toes in, then beginning in the learner pool under Rachel's guidance and supervision, very quickly

changed as it became the deep end when a year into my curacy she left. It has, however, been an amazing opportunity to learn and to grow alongside a much greater range of teachers than had Rachel been in post my whole curacy.

I've had the privilege of not just one Training Incumbent but three! Thank you to Rachel, James Shakespeare and Jim who has helped me tie loose ends and reflect over the last eight months. But I have also been able to work much more closely with Tom and Andrew too. We are blessed that they choose to serve our churches in addition to their other jobs and commitments. It has been great to learn from each of them and be part of the team. Thank you both.

The vacancy and shape of the last three years in these parishes has meant that I have worked even more closely with many of you and it has been a privilege to be part of the different ministries you offer from Toddles, Junior Church and Pizza by Candlelight to policy discussions at PCC or journeying together when you have welcomed me to hold space for your families at times of grief. It has been a privilege to be alongside you.

I've learnt a lot about church identity too as you have transitioned from one vicar, through the vacancy and parish profile process, to a new vicar. Trying to articulate one's identity is perhaps one of the hardest tasks to do. Sometimes it takes someone from outside to tell us what is visible to them in our actions and manner, which to ourselves are so familiar we cannot see it.

The readings for the last Sunday I will be leading are about the Transfiguration, Jesus's appearance being

changed on the mountain top in the presence of Peter, James and John (Luke 9:28-36). Jesus' face shines and his physical appearance is transformed to reveal his identity as God. This amazing story is reflected upon in the second reading, 2 Corinthians 3:12-4.2. We are reminded in that reading, that it is through our actions and the way we live and work together, our identity, that Christ can be revealed to others.

This poem by St Theresa of Avila, comes to mind:

Christ has no body but yours,

No hands, no feet on earth but yours,

Yours are the eyes with which he looks

Compassion on this world,

Yours are the feet with which he walks to do good,

Yours are the hands, with which he blesses all the world.

Yours are the hands, yours are the feet,

Yours are the eyes, you are his body.

Christ has no body now but yours,

No hands, no feet on earth but yours,

Yours are the eyes with which he looks

compassion on this world.

Christ has no body now on earth but yours.

I am excited to see how you continue to find your identity as the worshiping communities of Christ in this place and serve in and with your communities.



Cambridge Money Advice Centre: Charity of the Month



Our Charity for the Month is sponsored by Shev Roser who asks you to donate generously. The collection Sunday will be the 16th March, not the 9th when access to the church will be limited by the Cambridge Half Marathon.

Here at Cambridge Money Advice we know one of the hardest parts of getting help is making the first contact and coming to our office. Despite the continual increase in need for debt advice and frequent content in news programmes there is still a huge amount of fear and shame involved in seeking help. Julie had finally realised that, after 18 months of just hoping it would all go away, she needed help to sort out the debts related to the breakdown of her relationship. She gave this quote after her first meeting with her two advisers.

We work with people living in and around Cambridge who are struggling with unmanageable debts to get things back under control. As a regulated debt advice charity we can work with creditors to find a solution - either a payment plan or, when appropriate, a debt write-off by providing evidence about the actual situation. We stand in the gap between the creditor and the debtor and help each to understand the other. All this is free to our clients; this is why we need to ask for financial support from people such as yourselves.

When someone comes to us the first step is to look at the income and expenditure and the debts; this may take several meetings as the

lives of our clients are complex and debt may be only one of several areas they need help in. We then stabilise the situation, contact creditors and finally make recommendations for solutions. We will then help our clients put these into place whilst also ensuring that they are managing their money to the best of their abilities.

So much debt advice is now available via other agencies but it requires phone or internet capabilities and for the clients we see the complexity of their issues makes these methods too difficult to deal with. Many of our clients do not have computers or so called smart phones to be able to engage successfully and, for others, their anxiety is heightened by using the phone.

Over the last year we have supported people fleeing abusive relationships, people whose relationships have broken down or who are going through mental or physical health issues or who have lost jobs and homes, and those for whom written communication is difficult. We see people who contact us directly and those who are signposted or referred by other agencies. We will work with someone for as long as it takes and as long as they remain committed to the process, and this is why we get results and is also why we regularly have a waiting list.

Sadly, most of the people we see delay seeking help so the situation grows more complex with threats of eviction, court action and bailiffs often being the prompt to take action. Like Julie they are just not ready to get help; however these delays lead to increased cost and complexity in their cases. It is not unusual for a client to have more than 12 debts and the average amount of unsecured debt is running around £12,000.

We have an amazing but small team of trained and experienced volunteer debt advisers. They show an amazing mix of compassion and care to the clients they help, whilst also being willing to challenge creditors to get the best for the clients. They have an eye for detail and they are able to apply the principles of debt advice to complex situations. When I come to see you in March I will share some of our clients' stories in more detail. We are able to make a huge change in people's lives, taking them from a place of darkness back toward hope. You will have heard many times on the news about the cost of living crisis or the choice between heating and

eating – we are seeing it in real life here in Cambridge more and more.

Each case we help is a life improved and in some cases a life saved. This past year we will have seen a similar number of clients with even more debt.

Our funding comes from churches and individuals, and grant funding from the council and local charities. Our main cost is to pay me as Centre Manager and I am our only paid member of staff. My role is to do all I can to keep things running smoothly, handling some of the admin and also ensuring we remain compliant to the various FCA regulations which underpin our work, whilst also supporting the volunteers and doing some debt advice myself and triaging new potential clients. The remainder of our budget goes on paying for our membership to Community Money Advice, our various insurances, training and room rental and communication costs.

Finally, I want to thank you in advance for your support both financially and also in prayer – what we do can be challenging as well as rewarding.

After much research it is clear the one national recycling organisation, Terracycle, is now only collecting through Superdrug.

A small number of packets can still be dropped at Superdrug (by the pharmacy counter). By the way, 'all foil only' (no mixed materials) packets can go in our Blue bins (recyclable).

The Four Loves: A Lenten Course on Love for St Mark's

'God is love' says St John (1 John 4.8, 16); 'All you need is love' sang John Lennon. But what does love really mean? Sixty-five years ago C. S. Lewis published his classic book *The Four Loves*, an expansion of a controversial series of radio talks he gave in 1958. Lewis discussed four Greek words for love (eros, storge, philia and agape), and this coming Lent four gifted speakers will be exploring their themes in one-hour sessions on Sunday afternoons from 3.00 pm to 4.00 pm. Our speakers and themes are as follows:

9th March eros (romantic love/desire) Mike Thompson

16th March storge (family love/empathy) Debbie Whitton Spriggs

23rd March philia (friendship love) Andrew Hurst

6th April agapē (New Testament/Christian love) Jim Robinson

Each session will begin with an address of between 15 and 20 minutes on the given type of love. People are not expected to read Lewis's book in advance; the speaker will unpack helpful insights from the relevant chapter and add their own thoughts to its ideas and themes. C. S. Lewis will thus be a resource rather than the focus. The speaker will then lead a discussion, taking questions and posing others to allow discussion by the audience. We will close each session with a short service of evening prayer and then have tea at 4.00 pm.







The Electoral Roll

The electoral roll lists all members of our church who have voting rights at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM). The number of names on the roll also determines how large a church we are considered to be, which in turn affects various points of church governance. Therefore it is important to have an accurate and up to date roll. For this reason, every six years all parishes in the Church of England are required to draw up a completely new electoral roll. 2025 is one such year.

If you wish to be included on the new roll (irrespective of whether or not you were on the previous one) you must complete an application

form and return it no later than Friday 25th April. The earlier the better! There are blank forms in the narthex, or you can find a digital copy here. Forms can be given to Felicity in person, left in the administrator's in-tray in the vestry, or emailed to administrator@stmarksnewnham.org.

It is the primary means by which I am able to keep in touch with you, and also provides the list of names we use to pray for members of our congregation at morning and evening prayer throughout the week.

On the Buses Update



I trust readers of Seek found useful the combined timetable of departures from Barton Road on weekdays heading inward, printed in February Seek. I would appreciate your comments and suggestions on this, as my aim is to make the

information as easy to read as possible. We have printed some A4 and A5 posters in colour, including a large A3 size print in the Community Centre. I am preparing a similar combined timetable for buses leaving Newnham in the opposite direction. We would like to distribute these more widely as a service to the local community, but we shall wait until it is clear what amendments, if any, Whippet make in their summer timetables.

I have been helped by Hugh Clough to establish who in the Combined Authority is responsible for bus stops and bus shelters and to meet with a senior manager at Whippet Buses to discuss some positive suggestions and proposals for the 18 and Ubus service in Newnham. Both of these tasks have proved very difficult to pin down but I hope we shall have something to report before long.

I am also investigating the bus tracker apps available on our smartphones, especially the ones

provided by Whippet and Stagecoach, for ease of use. I continue to recommend that you check online for 'Service Updates,' which give daily and updated details of cancelled services. We are luckier than most people living outside London to have over 50 buses a day stopping at Newnham in each direction. But, as I shall point out to senior management, a bus journey completed on time is appreciated and then forgotten, but a bus that fails to turn up, leaving you stranded at the bus stop, is remembered and commented on for days, if not weeks or months.

To end on a positive note, I successfully completed in February a journey using three different buses (U1, 905 and X5) from Newnham to Milton Keynes and back the next day and all six departures and arrivals were on time!

It includes four extra 18/18A buses on Saturdays and all the buses shown in the present timetables will be running, with a minute or two difference in some of the U1 times - well within the normal margin of error due to traffic conditions.

Bible Reading Fellowship Notes



This is a reminder that in March I shall be renewing our church-rate subscription with the Bible Reading Fellowship, who produce a number of publications to "sustain people in their daily journey with the Bible".

Subscription rates apply from May 2025.

• For busy people the most accessible of these is probably **New Daylight**. Each issue provides four months of daily Bible readings and comment, with a team of regular contributors drawn from a range of church backgrounds and covering a varied selection of Old and New Testament biblical themes, characters and seasonal readings. Each issue contains nine topics of fortnightly readings and is published three times a year in January, May and September. Available in regular and large-print editions, a single regular copy costs £5.25, the large print edition £6.35. By taking out the church-rate subscription from May 2025, you get a valuable saving of 3 issues for £15.75 postage free for the regular edition, and £19.50

for the large-print version, whereas an individual subscription costs £21.30 and the large-print version £26.55.
