### The Vicar's Letter



Dear Friends,

I was recently part of our annual Parish Quiet Day, when 15 of our number headed out to the retreat house at Little Gidding, for a day of reflection, prayer and stillness.

Now I must admit that this has been a rather hectic week.

There are quite a few jobs not yet done and people not checked in on my conscience. So I went to Little Gidding secretly armed with my laptop and a packet of chocolate fingers, hoping to catch up on work on the sly (there's an insight into my working methods for you!).

But in the end, my laptop and - even more miraculously - the packet of chocolate fingers - remained unopened. Because as soon as we began our first period of free time, I felt an invisible hand guide me to an enticingly positioned bench. It sat in a gap between hedges, on a piece of high ground, overlooking an expanse of heavenly English landscape, of ploughed fields and sheep pasture, land returning back to a soft green hue after the summer's parching, whilst the chestnut trees rusted, and a spine of poplars quivered in the bright breeze. Clouds towered and a single church spire punctured the horizon.

And a verse from the psalms, which has always been dear to me, but which, like all precious things, is open to neglect, came to mind:

'On God alone my soul in stillness waits' [Psalm 62.1]

I am by no means the first person to feel the peace of that place. Little Gidding was of course the setting for T.S. Eliot's final poem in his 'Four Quartets', where he wrote of a visit made in the midst of the Blitz, in a frozen winter- 'the dark time of the year'- and experienced 'the intersection of the timeless moment'; the feeling of being 'suspended in time', where the promise of eternity could be 'half-heard, in the stillness/ Between two waves of the sea'.

I have also been reflecting on the story of the Good Samaritan, Jesus' tale of one man's heroic undertakings on a stranger's behalf. On the one hand this famous parable can feel, in stark contrast to the scene I have just described, like a rather daunting call to action. But it is as much about what God does for us as what we are supposed to do for one another. And, for me at least, the most striking thing that the Samaritan gives up is not his money, or his effort, but his time. All that time he suddenly dedicates to the injured man-unexpected, undiaried and without any obvious endpoint.

There is a strong echo in the story of the way God is described in the twenty third psalm, with its well-known opening statement, 'The Lord is My Shepherd, I shall not want'. The psalmist goes on to say how the Lord will wait on us, accompany us even in the valley of the shadow of death (as the Samaritan did for the robbed man in the story) and that he longs to lavish us with good things, things we need. Oil and wine, again as in the parable, restoring our soul, overflowing our cups.

So we can read this parable not simply as a call to action, but as a reminder of God's patience and mercy, of the time he takes with us. God has time for us. Perhaps by recalling God's patience with us, we might also find it easier to be patient with ourselves, and grant ourselves the permission, in Eliot's stirring words, not to 'verify, Instruct [...] inform curiosity/ Or carry report', but simply to be still, which is the essence of prayer, and the kindling of faith.

### The October Charity: Support for Gombe Diocese

The issue of identity is one which constantly faces Nigerians who have chosen to be Christians and who live in the north of their country. One of their challenges is that other Nigerians believe that by being Christian they are somehow not fully African. This is the point made in the name of the terrorist group *Boko Haram*. Those words can mean that Western features of modern life, such as secular schools, are 'forbidden'. Their implication is that being a Muslim is nowadays more African than being a Christian.

But this overlooks the fact that both Christianity and Islam have their roots in the Middle East, that part of the world where Europe, Asia and Africa physically meet. Jesus left his disciples with the task that the gospel must be preached "to the ends of the earth" (Acts 1.8). So Christianity, like Islam later, spread out from the Middle East. In that sense all of us when choosing a religious affiliation take on a new identity, alongside our ethnicity and geographical roots.

Jesus clearly believed He was setting up a world-wide church. North Africa was initially Christianised before Europe. Gradually the faith moved to the outer reaches of the continent. A recent BBC documentary about St Patrick showed pictures of Europeans looking out from the steep mountain, Croagh Patrick, towards the Atlantic Ocean, remembering that in St Patrick's time people really believed they had reached the end of the earth there.

Christianity reached the coasts of southern Africa as European explorers found their ways round Africa heading for Asia. It moved inland in Nigeria in the 18th and 19th centuries. A key figure in this was Samuel Ajayi Crowther. Having been taken into slavery in 1821 from his home in the Yoruba speaking west of Nigeria, Crowther lived in Sierra Leone after he had been rescued from a slaving ship. His gifts in learning languages were recognised in his work of translation. He became ordained, was later awarded a doctoral degree, and when a mission to Nigeria was organised in 1841 Crowther was part of it. In 1864 he was appointed as the Bishop of Niger, the first black person to hold such a post in the Anglican church.

There are now more practising Anglicans in Nigeria than in Britain. In supporting Gombe diocese we are helping African brothers and sisters to maintain their identity, not as European Christians but as Africans. As we have observed the moves towards the choosing of a Pope and the ongoing process of finding a new Archbishop of Canterbury, we are seeing how our western-based churches are recognising institutionally the shifting of the balance in the Christian world. Within that reality we at St Mark's are reflecting our belief that the best model to work towards is for churches worldwide to help each other.

### On the Buses: the Future

An open letter to all who are responsible for our bus service.

Whippet buses organise a good bus service through Newnham, which at its best can provide four buses an hour in each direction and take us directly and quietly in clean, modern electric buses to the centre, rail station and Addenbrooke's Hospital from 6 am to 11 pm, not to mention choice destinations such as King's College Chapel (near), the Fitzwilliam Museum and the Botanic Gardens. One change of bus will take us from Newnham to most areas of the city, as I have shown in previous articles in Seek (available on our St Mark's website) and the On the Buses leaflet.

I suggest the following objectives for this service, all of which make commercial sense to me:

Replace the hideous bus shelters which disfigure our main roads.

At weekends. divert all U2 buses along Barton Road, the U1 route. The only U2 bus stop in West Road is hardly used at weekends and the University Library is as accessible from the Robinson College stop on the U1. This would double the number of buses calling at the three Newnham bus stops at weekends at no extra cost to the company.

Move the main arrival bus stop, returning from the city centre, from Barton Road/Hardwick Street to Newnham Road opposite the inward stop. The existing stop has to cope with 50 buses a day with passengers served badly on a narrow pavement and road traffic blocked. Newnham Road is spacious and welcoming.

Introduce a Sunday service on the 18 route. Sundays in Cambridge are as busy as weekdays.

Provide a live bus tracker at all main bus stops e.g. Newnham Road, the nearest stop for most Newnham residents.
